BIRDS OF PREY



Our October speaker is Gina Holt who is dedicated to a special kind of bird called a "Raptor" - a bird of prey. Raptors include hawks, owls, kestrels, osprey and eagles. They are an integral part of our ecology, particularly here in central Florida. In addition to giving us insights into how they live, mate, nest and hunt she will bring two of her specimens: a barred Owl and a red shouldered hawk. She will also cover their adaptations, food chain, habitats, conservation and the environment.

Ms. Gina Holt, a raptor rehabilitator and environmental educator. She has been involved in bird rescue and rehabilitation for over ten years and providing environmental education classes with live birds for the last five. The rescue of her first raptor was a life-changing event for her. She decided she wanted to work closely with raptors. She first volunteered and then became a staff member at the Audubon Center for Birds of Prey in Maitland. About five years ago, she started her company, Wild About Birds, Inc., dedicated to environmental education, conservation and preservation of habitats for the benefit of Florida's birds and other wildlife.

TALES FROM THE OLD PROFESSOR

YOU WANT IT WHEN? (Part 2)



When we left off, I was about to embark on a tour of the Kennedy Space Center in a 1971 Citroen Deaux Chevaux. We rattled and smoked down the road and folks were pointing, waving and giving thumbs up. I waved back and felt like some sort of minor celebrity at the Space Center.

After a quick lunch we clattered off in the Citroen to the building where Space Shuttle Discovery was being decommissioned. My tour guide was extremely knowledgeable and provided me with a wealth of information about the Shuttle Program. He also seemed to know everyone and was able to get me into areas reserved for real VIPs.

Discovery flew its first mission, STS-41D in August 1984 and has spent 365 days, one entire year, in space racking up 148 million miles. Discovery made its last landing at the Kennedy Space Center on March 9th 2011 and has undergone a year-long decommissioning in preparation for its new home at the Udvar-Hazy Center of the Smithsonian Institution at Dulles Airport in Virginia. Discovery made the piggyback trip atop the Boeing 747 SCA, Shuttle Carrier Aircraft, and is now at the Udvar-Hazy museum.

My host and I clambered all over the scaffolding surrounding the spacecraft; peered into hatches, ports, and holes and finally, got to go inside the vehicle. This required emptying everything from my pockets tying a string on to my glasses and wearing "booties" to prevent tracking dirt into the shuttle or stuff falling out of

pockets as I climbed the narrow ladders between the different decks of the orbiter.

During my stay in the orbiter I was able to see some of the avionics that I did preliminary radiation hardening studies back in the early 1970's. Wow! That was a long time ago! There it was; still working after all those years; now going to a museum. Sometimes I wonder if that is where the Old Professor should be; in a museum. Banish that thought!

Then came the big moment; I was invited to sit in the commander's seat and grasp the controls. I felt like I was 10 years old again sitting behind the wheel of my father's car, making motor noises and pretending to drive. Thank goodness Space Shuttles arrive without motors or I would have felt foolish adding motor noises to my fantasy.

Being a pilot and an avionics guru, I was familiar with all the instruments and controls and felt at home in the Commander's seat and really could imagine what it was like to land that air/space craft.

But alas, it was time to leave the orbiter and sit in a more down-to-earth seat in the Deaux Chevaux and rattle and smoke our way back to the parking lot where I welcomed the silence and clean exhaust of my car and made my way back home.

Some readers have suggested the Old Professor's tales may be embellished. Preposterous! But this time I left something behind. There was an entranceway to the door of Discovery, which involved a stairway and some benches where you would don the booties and empty your pockets. I was told the plan was to take that entranceway to the Smithsonian and use it as a platform for visitors to be able to see the orbiter's flight deck. I was invited to sign my name on the wall of the entranceway along with others who had the privilege of this tour. If you go to the Smithsonian to see Discovery, look just inside the door at the top of the stairs on the right; you will see my name.
