SEPTEMBER PROGRAM

PREHISTORIC ANIMAL DISCOVERIES IN THE DAYTONA BEACH AREA

Zach Zacharias will speak about the Prehistoric animals that roamed this area during the last ice age. Daytona Beach and the area around Nova Road was a hotbed of animals like the Giant Ground Sloths, Mastodons and Mammoths. Several years ago during a graveling operation, the bones of a number of South American Giant Ground Sloths were found near the corner of Reed Canal Road and Nova Road. Last year during the evacuation of a retention pond in Holly Hill, near the corner of Mason and Nova Roads, the remains of an Ice Age Mastodon was unearthed. Zach will talk about these discoveries, the evacuation of the fossils, the significance of these finds, and the preservation of the remains. He will also bring along some of the fossilized bones, from these evacuations, for closer inspection.

YOU WANT IT WHEN? (Part 1)

A few months ago I got a call from Kennedy Space Center asking if I could give a 3 hour tutorial on radio communications for engineers at the Center. After discussing what subjects and at what level I asked when they wanted the course. The answer? Next week! This would be a formidable task so I wondered if there would be a reward. "Is there any remuneration for this?" I asked. "No". "What about travel expenses?" "No, but we would be happy to provide a tour of the facilities".

I have had special tours not available to the public of areas of the Space Center and they were very informative and enjoyable, so I didn't turn down the request. Someone at the University told my contact that I was able to do the impossible so for the reputation of the University I accepted the challenge.

The course went fine. The attendees asked a lot of questions and were obviously interested and learned a lot. Now it was time for my expected tour. But there seems to be a problem. My contact said the person who was to give me the tour was at an all-day meeting; could I come back some other time? It is a 150 mile round trip and I was truly annoyed and pointed out the length of the trip.

A fellow who was standing with my contact said "I can take him". "In your car?", my contact exclaimed. "Yes". "In your car?", was repeated with the same answer. Now, this fellow was wearing a Citroen Polo shirt and I asked, much to the surprise of my contact "Is your car a Deaux Chevaux". Yes was the answer.

Deaux Chevaux is French for 2CV which is a Citroen model that is in the opinion of your humble correspondent the ugliest car ever designed. Almost 9 million were made and used throughout Europe and provided inexpensive transportation for decades. Inspector Clouseau drove them in two of the Pink Panther films. Need I say more about style?

The Deaux Chevaux is an odd car inside and out. The shift lever comes out of the dash board which is at arm's length in this very small car. Automatic transmission? Ha, ha, ha, no way. The interior is Spartan at best. Only the front windows are roll-up. The seats are hardly padded. Sound deadening? Same as automatic transmission. The 2CV had its good points in that it was nearly indestructible and affordable for the European middle class. It also had its bad points, one of which was it consumed oil. The Citroen fix for this was a clip under the hood that held a liter bottle of oil.

The original 2CV had a 9 hp engine and a top speed of 40 mph. An export version made for US freeways

had a 29 hp engine and could top out at 71 mph and was imported until 1981 when US Federal standards excluded the car from import. Owners said the car could go from 0 to 60 mph "in a day" and they had to call ahead for an appointment to merge into US interstate traffic.

Having always wanted to experience how millions of Europeans fared in the Deaux Chevaux I accepted my volunteer tour guide's offer and we headed to the parking lot to begin the adventure.

"It's over there", my tour guide pointed out. "I know; I can see it". It was yellow and black and stood out like a beacon in the night. It looked like a giant bumble bee on wheels. We got in and started the bumble bee with a roar, smoke and a lot of rattling and backed out of the parking spot and headed out for the tour. ...to be continued.
